"He suggested them at Houghton and the horse now wears them all the time." said Gemma. "I know several leading riders use alloy shoes at three-days and I think they have helped my horse's performance. He's quite big and he's struggled to get the time in the past. I didn't think he would be quick enough here but he definitely was."

Section C winner Kathryn Robinson was recording her first ever intermediate victory, which was something of a miracle as to do so Kathryn has had to overcome a serious loss of nerve.

"I rode the wrong horses and had a crisis," explained the rider who is based with her boyfriend, Giovanni Ugolotti, at Headley Stud. "I had an old horse with whom I did everything and after he broke down I assumed I could just climb on anything but that affected me badly. Giovanni was great, though, and he told me no pressure

For this reason Kathryn only bought Let It Bee to contest BE100 and novice classes.

"I got him from Germany," she said of the Westphalian/ Thoroughbred. "He hadn't evented and he stuck his tongue out - a problem that put others off buying him. He still does it in the jumping phases but we've sorted the problem in the dressage now."

Apart from the final water, competitors found two other fences on Jonathan Clissold's 21-fence intermediate course testing - the skinny brush 'hide' that followed a step up at fence 9 and the Protexin Corners (11), with brush corners as the a and c elements with a skinny sandwiched in between. It was here that both of Daniel Sibley's rides, Royal Connection II and Playtime IV, ran out, as did Andre Nicholson's Viscount George.

"The cross-country is good because its educational for all horses," said Andrew.
