came home with victories. Aaron rode Isle Valley into the top spot in section H, while Jodie triumphed in the 23-strong under-21 open intermediate section with Zamor II (see box, above left).

"Isle Valley is a very elegant and attractive mare," said Aaron. "She's phenomenal on the flat and is rangy and scopey, so I'm really excited about her future."
